



# Medicare Advantage Part B Premium Rebate

Medicare Advantage Part B Premium Rebates, commonly referred to as Part B Giveback or Part B premium reduction, are a reduction in a member's Medicare Part B premium offered on certain MA plans, which may help members boost their monthly budget.

## Key Features



**A subset of Medicare Advantage Prescription Drug plans promote the rebate** as a priority feature of the plan. These plan names feature the descriptor "Giveback." (e.g., AARP Medicare Advantage Giveback from UHC OH-17 (HMO-POS)).

- Medicare Advantage plans without Part D coverage also offer a Part B Premium Rebate and include the description "Patriot No Rx" in their name. Nearly all Peoples Health plans offer a Part B Premium Rebate.



Select plans have nominal rebates of \$3 or less. These plans do not include the descriptor "Giveback" or "Patriot No Rx" in their name. Therefore, the nominal rebates are not a priority feature of the plans. You can see the nominal rebates when using Medicare Product Portal and UnitedHealthcare shopping sites.

## How does it work?

- To be eligible to receive the rebate, the member must pay their Part B premium. If Medicaid or another party pays for the enrollee's Part B premium, the rebate value will be returned to Medicare rather than the member.
- A member's Medicare Part B premium can be paid a couple ways, with the most common being through their monthly Social Security check or directly to Medicare.
  - If the member normally pays their Part B premium through their Social Security check, they will see an increase on their check each month. The increase is for the portion UnitedHealthcare is paying for the member's Part B premium, which the member is no longer paying.
  - If the member normally receives a statement to pay their Part B premium, they will see the portion UnitedHealthcare is paying for them as a credit on their statement.
- The member's Part B premium reduction benefit is set up by Medicare and administered by the Social Security Administration. The premium reduction (rebate) may take several months to appear on the member's statements; however, members will receive a full credit for the months they were enrolled in the MA plan with a Part B Premium Rebate. If no payment has been made after three months, members should contact the Social Security Administration.
